MUSI**C**ÓRUM

MUSICORUM is a project-based chamber choir of experienced singers, mainly based in and around Cork, many of whom are also music teachers, choral conductors and instrumentalists. In common with every other choir we were prevented from rehearsing and performing for the past two years because of Covid-19, which is why we are so excited by this performance. As well as three immortal motets by 19th-century Austrian composer, Anton Bruckner, we sing the stunning Alleluia by 20th-century American composer, Randall Thompson.

We are particularly proud that our recital includes, as its centrepiece, the first performances of a new work by choir member, Cork composer Dave O'Keeffe.

The choral works of the concert frame a performance of movements from J. S. Bach's popular *Partita* in E major, played by Cork virtuoso, Brendan Garde.

We end with a new setting of "Prayer for Ukraine", a spiritual anthem composed in 1885 by Mykola Lysenko, from a text by Oleksandr Konysky, which acquired symbolic significance during the Ukrainian War of Independence 1917-1920, and is widely sung at many gatherings today, both religious and secular.

Dave O'Keeffe

Dave is a trumpeter, singer and composer from Cork. Born into a musical family, he graduated from CIT Cork School of Music in 2014 with a First Class Honours BMus Degree, specialising in trumpet performance, and since then has gone on to tour and perform with numerous groups including the RTÉ Concert Orchestra, the Glasshouse Ensemble, and The Coronas. A passionate choral singer, he has been a member of the Bach Choir in London, Voci Nuove in Cork, and since moving to Dublin in late 2020, New Dublin Voices.

O magnum mysterium was conceived during lockdown in April 2021, inspired by the opening bars of Le Gibet from Maurice Ravel's suite of piano pieces Gaspard de la Nuit. The haunting opening ostinato resembles the sombre bell tones in Ravel's work, and continuously underpins the entire first half of this piece.

The unsettling modal harmony of the first "O magnum mysterium" section reflects the great mystery surrounding the story of the Nativity. Here, the eerie accompaniment to the main theme introduced by the solo soprano evokes a quiet, winter night where the anticipation of Christ's birth is ever present, and an image is conjured of the animals in the stable lit by flickering candlelight.

The second "Beata virgo" section is inspired by a 15th century motet, where the theme is introduced and joined in imitative counterpoint by other voices. The female voices represent the Virgin Mary and the warmer harmony and subsequent build up signifies the upcoming joy of the coming of Christ.

The exultant "Jesum Christum" section follows, with the descending Alleluia pattern a reference to the closing bars of the most famous setting of *O magnum mysterium*, by the late sixteenth-century Spanish composer, Tomás Luis de Victoria. Here, the joy of Christ's birth is brought forth in jubilation by the full choir as the ostinato singers join their ranks.

The piece abruptly sidesteps to a flurry of activity in a new tonal centre as the "O Magnum", "Beata virgo" and "Alleluia" themes are interspersed with each other. As the piece winds down, a sombre "Alleluia" coda brings the work back full circle to the opening ostinato, and the ghostly "O Magnum" and "Beata Virgo" themes are hinted at one final time before the ostinato fades into nothing.
